MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD CHAIR

Last year, ONPHA completed our three-year strategy, Opening Doors Through Housing, which laid the foundation for significant progress in our sector. This strategy guided us through extraordinary challenges and resulted in a major achievement — changing legislation that allows housing providers to transition away from outdated funding agreements.

As we move forward, our new strategy, Building Bridges: A Collaborative Vision for Housing, builds on that progress by continuing our advocacy efforts and focusing on practical, partnership-driven solutions. Community housing providers are under immense pressure — rising inflation, aging housing stock, affordability issues, and labour and supply chain constraints. At the same time, concerns around homelessness, staffing shortages, and increasingly complex tenant needs are growing. These challenges touch every part of our sector, from managing assets and operations to governance and adapting to new legislative frameworks. Now, more than ever, bold leadership and collaboration are critical.

Our goal is ambitious: to build 99,000 affordable homes over ten years. But we cannot achieve this alone. Success will require strong partnerships with government, nonprofits, private industry, and community networks.

Over the past year, our work with members and partners has focused on building these bridges — forging a stronger, more collaborative future for housing. Together, we can create a lasting impact that addresses the housing needs of today and lays a foundation for the future.

COHESIVE SECTOR LEADERSHIP

EXPANDING & SAFEGUARDING OUR FUTURE: BUILD, PROTECT, SUPPORT

ONPHA's Build, Protect & Support strategy is a plan to expand and preserve affordable housing. Over the past year, a major focus has been advocating for acquisition funding and demonstrating how the non-profit housing sector can play a key role in the supply solution. We've effectively influenced policies to bring more funding and efficiency to our sector.

We're not only working to add new units but also protecting the 300,000 homes already in place to ensure they remain permanently affordable. Our goal is to create at least 99,000 new non-profit units over 10 years, with the potential to add nearly 70,000 units immediately through member partnerships and funding support.

KEY RECOMMENDATIONS

PROVINCIAL

Build at least 99,000 new co-op and non-profit homes that are needed immediately, create at least 30,000 supportive housing homes over 10 years.

FEDERAL

That the Government of Canada support the protection of and increase in community housing supply that meets the needs of Canadians by enhancing the financial incentives and opportunities within the National Housing Strategy.

KEY POLICY WINS

- ★ The Cutting Red Tape Act will address stalled developments in ready to go projects, streamline approvals in certain types of housing to reduce delays and costs, invest in housing-enabling infrastructure, and remove sale tax on purpose-built rentals.
- The Build More Homes Act will fund \$1B for the new Municipal Housing Infrastructure Program and \$625 million more for the Housing-Enabling Water Systems Fund.
- The Building on Public Lands program will fund \$5M to support an overhaul of the Canada Lands Company to expand its activities to unlock more federal lands for affordable housing providers.

NEW FUNDING TRACKER

ONPHA launched an interactive online map to showcase government funding announcements for affordable housing projects in Ontario since June 2018. This tool details available funds and initiatives, making it easier for community housing providers to find the support they need for their projects.

TRANSLATING POLICY WINS INTO FUNDING DOLLARS

ONPHA's targeted advocacy efforts have been instrumental in securing over \$24 billion in funding. In 2024, we took time to reflect on our initiatives from recent years and assessed how these efforts have benefited housing providers.

The real impact of this funding is realized only when it reaches those in need. Our ongoing efforts will focus on advocating for the timely and efficient distribution of funds to housing providers, ensuring that they can make a meaningful difference at the community level.



FINANCIAL INCENTIVES & OPPORTUNITIES

TOP PROGRAMS/FUNDS TO RECEIVE FUNDING



These estimates highlight recent funding announcements in response to ONPHA's recommendations, they do not provide a comprehensive account of outcomes achieved to date. ONPHA continues to advocate for the non - profit housing sector to deliver sustainable, equitable housing and create communities where all people can thrive.

PROTECTING AND SUPPORTING THE SYSTEM

SECTOR TRANSFORMATION ENTERPRISE PROGRAM

ONPHA's Sector Transformation Enterprise Program (STEP) has been a key resource in members through the guiding entire transformation process as they prepare for End of Mortgage (EOM) and End of Operating Agreement (EOA) negotiations with their service managers. From self-reflection and planning to negotiation strategic and implementation, the program supports housing providers at every stage to ensure a strong and resilient sector.




The program offers professional services as well as guides and customizable templates for service and exit agreements, helping housing providers across Ontario prepare effectively. ONPHA has also begun meeting directly with service managers to better understand the negotiation process and where further support is needed.

UNLOCKING NEW RESOURCES: \$1 MILLION STEP GRANT FUNDING!

Announced at the 2023 ONPHA Conference, ONPHA, in collaboration with the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing, is providing funding support for the STEP Grant. This grant aims to assist housing providers in utilizing pre-qualified vendors within the STEP program, offering up to \$15,000 to one community housing provider in each service manager area.


LOW-END OF MARKET RENTAL HOUSING MONITOR

BRIDGING THE DATA GAP

There is still much to learn about deeply affordable rental housing in Canada. Now more than ever, we need access to data that demonstrates our sector's performance and highlights growth opportunities.

To address this, ONPHA partnered with the Canadian Centre for Housing Rights, Purpose Analytics, and Sharla Gelfand to create the Low-End of Market Rental (LEMR) Housing Monitor. This free, user-friendly tool gathers key data on affordable housing across six urban regions, tracking shifts in supply and guiding evidence-based policy decisions. It enables strategic investments at the neighbourhood level, ensuring affordability is protected and expanded where needed most.

As part of our continued advocacy, we aim to expand the tool across Ontario to support initiatives like securing acquisition funding and establishing a Non-Profit Housing Growth Fund, ensuring the sector's central role in Ontario's housing strategy.


MAPPING OPPORTUNITY

ONPHA launched our 2024 Mapping Survey to help us visualize untapped housing opportunities that already exist within the ONPHA community. The data we're collecting will help us map the potential for new housing or redevelopment for intensification.

This is allowing us to provide an updated affordable housing target and growth projections to government in a continued effort to recommend a Non-Profit Housing Growth Fund.

Our preliminary results are encouraging!

Respondents are reporting that if a Non-Profit Housing Growth Fund was made available to support capital and operating costs, non-profits could <u>almost triple</u> the amount of new housing they contribute to the system.



*These results reflect a sample size of nearly 100 ONPHA members from various small, mid-sized, and large housing providers across Ontario. We've ensured accuracy by excluding growth projections in municipalities with limited representation in the survey. Therefore, the projected growth within the ONPHA community over 60 months would likely exceed 70,000 units.

A PEOPLE-CENTRED INTEGRATED SYSTEM

BUILDING BRIDGES THROUGH PARTNERSHIPS & A SHARED VISION

We envision every Ontarian thriving in a home they can afford, and we know that this vision cannot be realized alone. A key focus this year has been on forging and strengthening partnerships with likeminded individuals and organizations that share our commitment to creating a brighter housing future. We are actively seeking new allies who align with our goals and can help drive meaningful change.

LEADERSHIP IN HOUSING SUPPLY SOLUTIONS

ONPHA's CEO, Marlene Coffey, continues to play a critical role on the Housing Supply Action Plan Implementation team. This team, hosted by the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing, brings together sector leaders to provide strategic advice to the government on implementing and evaluating Ontario's housing supply action plans.

Over the past year, we've intentionally expanded our outreach, particularly into the private development space. Building housing requires land, capacity, and funding. Community housing organizations possess two of these key components, making them strong partners to help solve the housing crisis.

We've actively engaged with the development sector and continue to maintain close relationships with all levels of government, consistently providing feedback, recommendations, and solutions through consultations and policy submissions.



ONP^hA OPENING DOORS PODCAST

HARNESSING TECHNOLOGY FOR GREATER IMPACT

In 2023, ONPHA continued to harness technology to expand our reach, raise awareness, and challenge the broader community to see our sector as a key part of solving Ontario's housing crisis.

INTRODUCING THE ONPHA OPENING DOORS PODCAST

The launch of the ONPHA Opening Doors podcast pilot was a major step in these efforts. The podcast shines a light on Ontario's housing affordability challenges and highlights the community housing sector's ability to drive meaningful solutions. Through in-depth discussions on current issues, member spotlights, and real-life stories, the podcast offers a platform for sharing impactful voices and ideas.

SPOTLIGHTING DIVERSE VOICES

We welcomed a wide range of guests, from sector thought leaders and practitioners to data scientists, and even an international expert from the Netherlands, who shared their insights and challenged our perspectives on addressing the housing crisis.

INVESTING IN DIVERSITY, EQUITY AND INCLUSION

REDI COMMITTEE UPDATE

The Reaching Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (REDI) Committee, supported by the ONPHA Board, has been working to gather insights from member organizations to understand the various stages that our members are at in their DEI journeys and how ONPHA can offer support. This work will allow the Committee to explore the creation of supports to enhance DEI and address systemic racism and inequalities in our sector.

HELPING INDIGENOUS STUDENTS WITH POST-SECONDARY EDUCATION COSTS

ONPHA's Kathleen Blinkhorn Indigenous Student Scholarship supports Indigenous students living in non-profit housing in Ontario. In 2023, scholarship winners received \$2,000 for use towards their post-secondary education costs, like tuition, books, technology and transportation.

2023 INDIGENOUS HOUSING PROVIDER GATHERING

Every year, ONPHA brings together Indigenous housing providers at the Indigenous Housing Provider Gathering, part of our pre-Conference programming. In 2023, providers met in Toronto to discuss our shared priorities around affordable housing solutions for Ontario's Indigenous communities. The event included presentations from NICHI and the federal and provincial housing ministries.




NAVIGATING LEGISLATIVE CHANGES WITH CONFIDENCE
